Breeds, Breeders and Animal Registrations

The stud industry remains buoyant with continued interest and new breeders joining respective societies. The industry is currently represented by 222 breeders across 18 breeds (two goat, one sheep, one dairy and 14 beef) with 16,962 animals over one year of age (see Table 1 below). The Herd Book registered 23 new breeders this year. For expedience, one Wagyu breeder registers with the Wagyu Society of South Africa. Please see attached breed report tabled at the recently held Council meeting.

Beef School 2022

A capacity attendance of 160 beef producers and service suppliers attended the Beef School this year where the theme was 'Financial Sustainability in Beef Cattle Production'. The event was once again held at Mystique Conference Centre in Bulawayo from 20th to 22nd September and was the first School for 90 (56%) attendees. A total of 23 presentations were given by local, regional and international speakers. Attendees note the most pertinent presentations were on grazing management.





Participants appreciated the deboning of the hind quarter, kindly donated by Grills, by blockman Fungai Nyagwande, supported by Chef Ryan Warham with display and discussion on the various cuts that were specially prepared for the luncheon and dinner.

54th National Breed Sale - July 2022

Following Covid-19 restrictions in 2020 and 2021, over 500 buyers, sellers and general public welcomed the opportunity to physically partake in the Herd Book's premier event of the year, the National Breed Sale. A total of 96 bulls and 66 heifers were entered and inspected by John Crawford and Dr Jackson resulting in an elite yarding of 71 bulls and 58 heifers being offered for sale. Viewing and bidding was also available online on the SwiftVEE sales platform.

Prices remained firm and comparable with 2021, averaging USD 4,962 for bulls and USD 1,700 for heifers (see tables and graphs below). Demand for Brahman was strong with a top-price of USD 13,500 for an OD Brahman bull followed by USD 11,000 for a Ruvale Brahman bull. Top prices for bulls for other breeds were USD 8,500 for Ruvale Beefmaster, USD7,000 for Langton Boran and USD 5,500 for Jambo Tuli. For the second consecutive year, Nkone bulls were on offer with a top price of USD 3,000. It was surprising and disappointing to see limited interest for outstanding Simbra and Simmental bulls on offer.




Figure 1. Number of bulls and heifers sold at the ZHB National Breed Sale, 2009 to 2022




Figure 2. Average USD equivalent price of bulls and heifers sold at the ZHB National Breed Sale, 2009 to 2022

<u>National Breed Sale 2023:</u> Next year's sale will be on **Saturday** 29th July 2023. Entries will close on Friday 28th April 2023.

<u>Note</u>: All animals must be parentage (Sire and Dam) verified and all Bulls must be Semen tested and vaccinated against vibrio.

Zimbabwe Beef Producers Society

On the back of ZHB stud breeders, inaugural meetings of the Zimbabwe Beef Producer's Society were held in October and November. Mr Shingai Jaravaza is the interim Chair and Mr George Chiunda is the vice Chair. The aim of the Society is to provide a voice and platform to champion interests of the sector and is open to all involved in the beef value chain and will encompass all ZHB members. Further information will be circulated in due course.

Courses

ZHB Breed Requirement Courses were held around the country with good attendance. Three additional capacity courses were offered in early December. Courses are designed to inform breeders of their requirements and formats for data submissions to the Herd Book. Next year ZHB will be promoting performance recording and the course dates will be circulated in the new year.

Foot and Mouth Disease

Chairman, Council and Breeders have and continue to make representation to authorities appealing for a pragmatic approach to control the disease, noting, that while disease control is paramount, blanket bans on movements were severely impacting on beef cattle production, breeding and trade and eroding viability of stakeholders.

Breeder Data Returns

Once again, special appeal to breeders to ensure timely submission of returns:

- Births within 60 days of birth
 - Requests for Information As Soon As Possible
- Transfers, Disposals and Fates (commercial sales, deaths) within 30 days
- Performance records (weights at weaning, yearling and 18-months, mature cow weights, scrotal circumference and days to calving) – as soon as possible

Copies of your **Herdlists**, **RFI's** and **Inspection Lists** (all CB animals over a year of age) will be sent to you before end of the year – please take the time to go through, check and return with corrections and your updated inspection reports.

Real Time Ultrasound (RTU) Scanning

Breeders are encouraged to review benefits of recording scan data on their young animals (300 to 800d of age) and book to have their animals scanned.
